

TAKING ACTION GIRL SCOUT HIGHEST AWARDS



To earn her **Girl Scout Bronze Award**, **Payton Duncan** designed and built five bee water stations to help pollinators access clean water as they travel miles between pollen and their hives. After reaching out to four community organizations, they all granted her request to place the water stations on their properties and maintain them. She plans to remove the water stations after the first frost of the season and replace them in the spring when hives become active again.

Wanting to provide their community with an affordable family activity, **Sophia Gourash, Emma Ladesic, Ava Moravek, and Claire Norris of Troop 28839** earned their Silver Award by creating a scavenger hunt at Adams Township's nature trail to get their community outdoors. The scavenger hunt included educational elements about native wild animals and has been passed on to their Girl Scout service unit to continue setting up annually.

Gold Award Girl Scouts are lifelong leaders who put their beliefs about women in leadership into action.

Nearly all Gold Award Girl Scouts (99%) hold leadership roles in their everyday lives—at school, in their careers, or through volunteer work and seven in ten hold three or more leadership roles.



Gold Award Girl Scout alums report that the Gold Award process helped them develop essential twenty-firstcentury employment skills, giving them a boost in their academic and professional lives.

Saving Lives-Girl Scout Medal of Honor

Brownie Girl Scout **Scarlett Nagy** of Johnstown Troop 11391 received the prestigious Medal of Honor for using her own first aid skills and determination to help save her mother's life. After being stung by a bee, Scarlett's mother had an anaphylactic reaction, causing her throat and mouth to swell and leading her to pass out. Scarlett reacted quickly, administering an epinephrine injection in her mother's upper leg, ultimately saving her life.

This national award is given to Girl Scouts who have shown presence of mind and Girl Scout spirit in an emergency, such as saving a life.



EXPLORING BEYOND GIRL SCOUT PROGRAMMING & OPPORTUNITIES

Eclipse Investigators

This year, Girl Scouts in western Pennsylvania had the opportunity to be Eclipse Investigators and participate in a large-scale citizen science research project leading up to and during the total solar eclipse on April 8, 2024. Through Einstein's Incredible Universe program, Girl Scouts collected data for the Dynamic Eclipse Broadcast (DEB) Initiative and documented the moment-bymoment appearance of the sun's inner coronaobservable only during a total solar eclipse. After months of training and preparation for this important astronomical event, Girl Scouts not only studied the solar corona-they also worked with NASA scientists, presented their work to other Girl Scouts, and participated in a research study about gender equality in STEM.



Inspiring Careers in STEM

Highlighting women in STEM who contribute their expertise to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, a National STEM Day event was held on November 13, 2023, in Harrisburg, bringing together Girl Scouts from our council, Girl Scouts of Eastern Pennsylvania, Girl Scouts in the Heart of Pennsylvania, and the Governor's Advisory Commission on Women. Female members of the Pennsylvania General Assembly were invited to join Troop PA, an honorary Girl Scout troop. These women discussed the work they do, their educational journeys, and why they chose their careers, hoping to inspire Girl Scouts to explore a career in STEM. Participating Girl Scouts also earned their STEM Career Exploration badge.



Girl Scouts Going Places

From regional day trips all the way to international trips, there are many opportunities for girls to explore the world with fellow Girl Scouts, see and learn new things, and create unforgettable memories.

Destination: Broadway Bound

Our council has a special grant just for Destination travel called D-Pass Funding, which is awarded annually. This year, **Senior Girl Scout Sophia Lang** received this funding and attended the Girl Scouts of the USA Destination trip, Broadway Bound.

Uniting Girls through Community Partnership

Our partnership with the United Way of Beaver County opened the door for more girls to participate in the Girl Scout Leadership Experience. Girl Scout meetings were held at different facilities through the Housing Authority of the County of Beaver, allowing us to remove transportation barriers and bring the Girl Scouting experience directly to underserved girls in this area. Because of this initiative, new troops were formed in areas such as Ambridge, Aliquippa, and Rochester, and an additional 31 girls experienced the popular Awesome Pawsome Day Camp in Beaver County.

Seeing the World

Two Girl Scouts, plus staff, volunteers, and family members from our council traveled to Italy and Greece this June as part of a council-arranged trip. While in Rome, they saw iconic sites such as the Colosseum. They also took guided tours of Athens and Delphi to see some of the ancient temples. We are dedicated to serving as a bridge for building new relationships, fostering collaboration, reaching underserved communities, and developing a community that thrives. It has been inspiring to see Girl Scouts Western Pennsylvania and the Housing Authority of the County of Beaver (HACB) flourish, working together to engage families living in housing authority properties.

- **91%** of girls felt they had the power to make decisions for themselves.
- **80%** of girls felt they learned more about the world around them.
- **76%** of girls felt they made new friends.
- 70% of girls felt they were courageous.

Growing with Confidence

(pictured left) arrived at Camp Conshatawba with different emotions-Abby, a seasoned camper on her fifth trip, was excited, while first-timers Brynn and Chloe felt nervous. Brynn worried about making friends, and Chloe feared being homesick. But as the days passed, camp transformed them.

Abby's confidence had grown with each camp experience, and this time was no differentespecially when she scaled the rock wall for the first time. Brynn quickly discovered that camp was full of fun and new experiences, like archery-her new favorite activity. Chloe, despite her initial fears, found strength in the support of her counselors and friends. She pushed through challenges and realized just how resilient she was.

Together, they tackled obstacles, won the Best Teamwork award, and created unforgettable memories. For these girls, Girl Scout camp wasn't just a summer activity. It was a journey of growth, teamwork, and discovering just how much they could accomplish when they believed in themselves and each other.





Our Camp Hawthorne Ridge was recognized as one of the nation's best summer camps of 2024, ranking among the top 22 camps in Pennsylvania! Camps were rated on parent survey results, social media reviews, and key criteria, such as activity selection, accessibility, staff-to-child ratio, and overall camp safety.

A Special Week Jumpstarts the Cookie Program

Girl Scouts Western Pennsylvania kicked off the Girl Scout Cookie Program with election week booth sales, allowing Girl Scout troops to sell cookies in person outside polling places and small local businesses from November 4-11, 2023. This limited-time program during the week of the general election allowed Girl Scouts to help their troops earn proceeds as they started their new Girl Scout year.

As a first-year troop, having a risk-free early fundraiser to infuse almost \$300 into our budget has enabled us to book an overnight at a council camp. We otherwise wouldn't have been able to commit the funds for a reservation.

Pamelah is autistic and nonverbal, and her mother, Diana, says she signed her up for Girl Scouts to help with her communication skills.

Pam has grown in more ways than just one through the Girl Scout Cookie Program. She was able to grow her handwriting skills (as she wrote her name on each delivery bag), she learned how to improve her counting and simple math skills, and especially how to talk and interact with people. It gave me (as her mom) an equal opportunity to educate others about autism and special needs. It was genuinely a great experience for the family as a whole.

2024 Awards of Distinction Event

Girl Scouts Western Pennsylvania honored 11 exceptional women and two Gold Award Girl Scouts for their accomplishments and leadership at our annual Awards of Distinction event, presented by Buchanan Ingersoll & Rooney PC and held at the Carnegie Science Center. This annual event honors inspirational women and celebrates the mission of the Girl Scout Movement.

An exciting addition to the event for 2024—eight Girl Scouts who earned their Gold Award attended the event to showcase their projects and network with other female leaders in the area.





2024 Girl Scout Humanitarian

Gold Award Girl Scout Eliza Davis held presentations to educate others about harm reduction and introduce an empathetic, evidence-based, effective perspective on drug use to a community typically only exposed to abstinence-focused approaches. She arranged hands-on NARCAN[™] administration demonstrations and created and distributed materials about how to respond to a suspected opioid overdose.



2024 Girl Scout of Distinction

Gold Award Girl Scout Sawyer Wright focused on increasing elementary school girls' confidence in themselves by providing positive role models for how to handle difficult but common situations. To accomplish this, she wrote, illustrated, and published the book *The Four Take on Fifth*, a story about four friends in fifth grade who overcome challenges with the help of friends and family. She led a team of volunteer artists to illustrate the novel. Diversity and relatability were among her top priorities in both the writing and illustrations. Copies of her book were donated to local and school libraries, Girl Scout troops, and nonprofit organizations.


